Easter Club







- read Roman numerals to 100 (I to C) and know that over time, the numeral system changed to include the concept of 0 and place value.

This term the children will be exploring 'Animals including Humans' with a focus on teeth and the digestive system. The children will learn to:

- Describe the simple functions of the basic parts of the digestive system in humans.
- Identify the different types of teeth in humans and their simple functions.
- Construct and interpret a variety of food chains, identifying producers, predators and prey.
- Use **secondary sources of information** to find out how food is digested in the body.
- Record observations of teeth in tables and labelled diagrams.
- Plan a comparative test to explore how different drinks affect our teeth using eggshells.
- I have modelled teeth from different animals and compared these with human teeth.

Computing

This term the children will:

- -Use a range of child friendly search engines to locate different media
- -Develop key questions and key words to search for specific information to answer a problem
- -Use appropriate tools to save and retrieve accessed information.

Solve addition and subtraction multi-step problems in contexts, deciding which operations and methods to use and why.

Use estimation to check answers to calculations.

Number - multiplication and division

Multiply multi-digit numbers up to 4 digits by a two-digit whole number using the formal written method of long multiplication.

Divide numbers up to 4 digits by a two-digit whole number using the formal written method of long division, and interpret remainders as whole number remainders, fractions or by rounding.

Fractions (including decimals and percentages)

Use written division methods in cases where the answer has up to two decimal places.

Solve problems which require answers to be rounded to specified degrees of accuracy.

Recall and use equivalences between simple fractions, decimals and percentages, including in different contexts.

This term pupils will be learning about football and basketball; they will practise relevant skills such as passing, dribbling and shooting, and will also get opportunities to play competitive matches.

History/Geography

Locate the Benin Kingdom on a map of Africa. Recall key facts and terms about the Benin Kingdom (such as definitions of Ogiso, Edo etc.) as well as important dates in history.

Examine and raise questions about key sources of evidence and artefacts about the significance of the Benin Kingdom.

Discuss the significance of the Benin bronzes and the reactions of the Victorian Europeans that discovered them.

Recall key facts about the story of Eweka and his rise to power as the fist Oba of the Benin Kingdom.

Discuss the influence and eventual destruction of the Benin Kingdom by the Portuguese and British from the 15th century.

PSHE: 1 Decision

Keeping/Staying Healthy

- -Healthy diet
- -Smoking and the causes and effects
- -Dangers of alcohol and how people can be affected.

Music/Art

Compare and contrast the artwork and artefacts created in the Benin Kingdom with those created simultaneously in European civilisations.

Design sculptures using clay Create Benin masks using paper mash.

YEAR 6 CURRICULUM MAP CONT.

Science: Animals including Humans

Identify and name main parts of the human circulatory system, and describe the functions of the heart, blood vessels and blood

Recognise the impact of diet, exercise and lifestyle on the way their body function

Describe the ways in which nutrients and water are transported within animals, including humans.

Computing

This term children will be learning filmmaking.

- plan and write a script using appropriate software;
- search for relevant information using appropriate websites;
- use a digital video camera (or similar device) to record;
- plan suitable questions to ask an interviewee;
- speak clearly into the camera when being recorded;
- import video files into video editing software.
- arrange video files to form a complete film.

Literacy: core book Harry Potter

Children will be taught the following skills:

Waltham Forest Council recently launched a crowdfunding campaign in response to the ongoing humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan. 
